## Edgewood program helps students with intervention, conflict resolution

WOOSTER DISTRICT — Mix together two media — art and community service — and come up with a concept Edgewood Middle School initiated this year, a Therapeutic Art Club.

On a recent Thursday after school, Sara Reith, school psychologist, highlighted students working in stations throughout the school as part of the intervention (invitation-only) program.

"We chose students we knew were budding artists," Reith said, then enrolled them in a club - not official art therapy, she clarified — to teach resilience and conflict resolution, in addition to promoting community service.

"They're great kids, helping our building and helping the community," Reith said, with "some of the projects they've had the opportunity to do."
